# Headteacher's Message

It seems impossible that we have already arrived at the first half term of the year. The new Reception classes are settled in, a number of new children have joined us in various year groups, and we have some new staff who already seem very much part of the team. As always, school has been a hectic hive of activity and this newsletter is packed with the things we've done. We were thrilled with the outcomes of our parents' survey, which we are sharing with you today, along with this newsletter. Of course, there is always more we can do, and we are grateful for constructive feedback in several areas, where we will be focusing our efforts in the coming year.

I would like to briefly share a new focus in teaching and learning. We are teaching children to actively practise recalling their key learning, across all subjects. Retrieval practice is something which is influencing teaching across the country, helping children to understand how to use their minds in the most efficient ways to make sure learning is secured in long term memory. We will return regularly to key learning from previous days, weeks, terms, and years, supporting children just enough to bring back those key memories. By doing this they the secure learning in long term memory and strengthen the retrieval pathway for the future. You can find out lots about this online, including on these links:

### FINAL REMINDER - SECONDARY SCHOOL PLACES

YEAR 6 Parents and carers must apply for a place at secondary school by 31<sup>st</sup> October. Apply online here.

<u>Parents' Evenings</u> - A reminder that bookings opened online on Tuesday. Please see the separate email about this. Bookings close on  $29^{th}$  October.

**Lip Balm.** As the winter approaches, some children will begin to need Vaseline or lip balm during the school day. If your child is in EYFS or Key Stage 1 please hand lip balm to the teacher and ensure it is clearly marked with your child's name. Children will be able to apply it before break times (3 times a day). If it is needed more often please speak to the teacher about this. If your child is in Key Stage 2 (Year 3 and up) then they can carry the lip balm with them during the day but, again, should apply it at break times unless there is a real need to do so more often. Please avoid sending flavoured or coloured products, so children are not tempted to see them as treats or make-up.

## Changes to the school day

We are planning some minor changes to the school day and times. We wanted to let you know well in advance:

From September 2024 we will be lengthening the school day by 5 minutes. Home time will be 3:20, rather than 3:15. The start of the school day will still be 09:00.

From next September the new children in EYFS will come in for half days in weeks 1 and 2 of term only, not for 3 weeks as we have done previously.

Starting in July 2024, we will close the school at lunchtime on the last day of the summer term and on the last day of the Autumn term (Christmas). This will bring us in line with the secondary school who do the same.

# MILEPOST 2


We have had a fantastic first term back, with lots of fun activities linked to our Scavengers and Settlers topic. We have followed the course of human evolution from the early Stone Age through to the Iron Age and discussed what life was like during this time. The children have created some wonderful pieces of work, inspired by their learning, both in and out of school.






Mrs Flintham showed us how Stone Age people gathered kindling (straw) and then used a bow and wood to start a fire. She

also showed us how they carried fire to a new place – with a King Alfred's cake fungus.













We rounded our term off with a visit to the World Heritage-listed Neolithic site of Avebury. The children were able to explore and experience the Stone Age construction and discover the history and possible uses of the henge. They visited the Alexander Keiller museum and saw many of the artefacts that have been discovered in and around the site. They also walked along some of the length of the West Kennet Avenue and were able to see Silbury Hill from a nearby hilltop.

















# MILEPOST 3



As we move towards the half term break, it has been lovely to reflect on the enthusiasm that the children have shown this term in learning all about the Celts, Ancient Romans, and the Anglo Saxons. This topic always feels so relevant to us in relation to its links to our local history. We have the legacy of the Romans evident around us such as with the Fosse Way being a local footpath and also with King Athelstan's tomb (the Anglo-Saxon king) being sited in the abbey. With respect to viewing artefacts, this term has been a special highlight in that one of our pupils was able to share and tell us all about some Roman artefacts that had been found on his family's farm. It was amazing to view items that were 2,000 years old! We then learnt that some of the artefacts from this find are now on show at the Corinium Museum in Cirencester. All the children were able to view them during our recent visits to the museum. You can read more about this in the report from the children below.

We were also very proud of the effort and sportsmanship that the Year 6 children demonstrated in taking part in the recent rugby tournament at Minety. It was wonderful that so many children were keen to take part and represent the school. We took 40 children in 4 teams with a mixture of girls and boys. They showed great enthusiasm and teamwork and one of the teams made it through to the final, coming second overall – a fabulous achievement! # OUR TRIP TO THE CORINIUM MUSEUM

We got on the bus on Friday the 6th of October 2023. After a twenty-minute drive, we were all excited to get inside.



First, we went to hang our bags up in the cloakroom and went to the first activity which was the Ancient Romans workshop. The different activities included: a quiz from our instructor James; dressing up as Roman or a Celt; a board game all about the map of the Roman Empire; identifying someone's grave stone and looking at a plastic skeleton, trying to work out who they were.

After that we went to the Roman exhibits to do the trail. We saw beautiful mosaics and the Tetbury Coin Hoard found by a student's (Henry's) grandfather which is now on show at the museum. Then we went to lunch.

Next, we went upstairs to do sketches (it was really fun) and to look around. We saw loads of different things like examples of jewellery which were very pretty. We also saw real gravestones from people called Mettus and Julia Casta.

After that, we went to the Anglo-Saxon section. We saw cool stuff like real human remains and daggers. We also saw a replica of a dead body (it was really creepy). Attached to the Anglo-Saxon part was the Civil war part with a large stuffed sheep (it felt really weird and real). There was also a wax figure holding a spear. After that, it was time to go.

It was the end of the day, and we were all exhausted. It was so fun, and we didn't want to go home, but we had to. When we walked out of the museum, we saw a double-decker bus and we all thought that we were going onto it but instead we went on the smaller bus hidden behind it - we were all disappointed!

After we had another 20-minute drive back to Malmesbury, we arrived back at school. Our trip was really fun but now it was over.

Year 5 went on the same trip on Tuesday, the 10th of October so they got to have the experience too.

# YEAR 6 TAG RUGBY TOURNAMENT


