

MALMESBURY C of E PRIMARY SCHOOL SPORT PREMIUM STATEMENT

‘Growing together in wisdom and love; discovering life in all its fullness’

What is the Sports Premium? In 2022-23 each primary school in England received £16,000 plus an extra £10 per pupil of DfE funding specifically for PE and sports provision. Malmesbury C of E Primary School received £19660.

Purpose of the funding

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer.






Possible uses of the funding include:

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers
- New or additional sport clubs
- Paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE/sport
- Running sport competitions, or increasing participation in the school games
- Buying quality assured professional development modules or material for PE/sport
- Facilitating or providing places for pupils on after school sport clubs and residential visits
- Procurement of new sports equipment and resources to support the teaching of PE
- Encouraging a healthy lifestyle
- Refurbishment of existing fixed equipment




Capital spending (fixed items over £1000) is not permitted.



Accountability for the Funding

Schools are required to publish an annual report (this document) detailing how they have spent their sport premium and reporting on its impact. A school should expect to see improvements across five key indicators. These are listed below. Our plans and evaluation are cross referenced to these using colour coding:

-  The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity
-  The profile of PE and Sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
-  Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and Sport
-  Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
-  Increased participation in competitive sport

Swimming Outcomes for 2022-23

Note: These figures are heavily affected by the Covid-19 pandemic which has meant that this cohort have missed two years of school swimming lessons. Swimming lessons were resumed from September 2021. Those not achieving the National Curriculum expectations were given additional lessons in the summer term to help them catch up, but the figures remain significantly below the levels achieved pre-pandemic.
